

CHAIRMAN'S UPDATE - WEEK COMMENCING SAT 8th JULY 2023

However, as a lot of bookings are now made online and in advance, this yields the benefit of bringing those pre-paid visitors to the railway irrespective of the weather on the day. Saturday

I was sitting in the 36-degree heat in Majorca. Meanwhile, back at the railway things seemed to be ticking along quite well with quite good visitor numbers. We had a Golden Arrow breakfast train and a Wealden Rambler which both had very good loadings.

Thursday

I was at Horsted Keynes for 9am, firstly doing some 'day job' work for an hour, followed by my usual catch-up with the C&W team, to go through weekly progress and the longer-term plans, plus any other issues that had arisen.

Progress on the Bicester Mk1 continues, also on Car 54; the north end east side windows are now out of 5034 (a 'disabled' Mk1). C&W had got slightly ahead with scheduled maintenance tasks, which had allowed Rowan and the team to focus on the Bicester Mk1 bogie overhauls.

Then it was off to Sheffield Park for a catch-up with Neil Glaskin, Lisa Boyle and Chris Knibbs, plus a meeting about Steamworks.

After my meeting with Neil and Lisa I decided I needed lunch, so Neil and I wandered off to the buffet, where I spotted pasta Bolognese and decided I would try that. Literally everyone (including the catering staff) asked me why I wasn't eating the pie! Pie did look just as good as it always does of course, but I couldn't have anything too heavy as I had a gym session at 5pm!

After lunch was done, it was time for the meeting about Steamworks with Malcom Johnson, museum curator; Graham Aitken, senior station master at Sheffield Park; Chris Knibbs; John Hutchins, loco yard foreman; Lisa, Neil, and me. Steamworks has never really been given proper ownership, but Malcolm has now kindly agreed to take it within the museum portfolio. Going forward, and working with station staff, loco dept and Lisa, we will ensure that we don't have displays out of action, that everything is kept clean, and that stewards are available for Steamworks all the time we are open to the public. Opening and closing of the facility will also be properly managed. We also discussed how we can further enhance things, especially now we have more engines on display. Overall, an excellent and very positive meeting.

I also chatted with two of our fantastic education guides. These guys take visiting school parties round the railway, making sure they see everything they need to. They take their parties in the signal box, to have a look on the footplate, to see where the guard sits and answer questions as they go. The children on these organised school visits will not only go home and tell their parents - and they may well return - but they are also future visitors and potential volunteers when they are older. Our education guides are further examples of those unsung heroes who do important work at the railway, and which we should all recognise and appreciate.



Friday

What a dismal day in terms of weather. Shall we just leave it there?!

We operated a two-departure service today, and the footplate experience was also running, plus there was a Murder Mystery Golden Arrow this evening. So it was another busy day, which demonstrated that revenue from premium offerings is still strong.

But I just want to say thank you to *all* of you for everything that you do: for the time you give up, for going that extra mile, as everyone (paid and volunteer) does all the time.
